

A Picture of the Future

Two years ago I saw a picture of beautiful Colchuck Lake, nestled well over 5,000 feet in altitude. Colchuck Lake is on a trail that ultimately leads to a high mountain part of the Cascades known as "The Enchantments." As soon as I saw this picture, my heart began to ache and hunger for the opportunity to see this lake in the shadow of mighty Dragontail Peak and Asgaard Pass with my own eyes. And five days ago, that opportunity came as I led a family expedition on an 8.2 mile hike climbing 2,200 feet in elevation. Upon our arrival at Colchuck Lake, it was even more spectacular than I realized it would be. The picture that had called out to me two years ago was now right in front of me, reflecting the glory of God the Creator. Crystal clear, ice cold, light blue-green water shimmering in the sunlight in front of a 3,000 foot rock wall towering high above into the sky. The picture made me hungry, but it wasn't nearly as incredible as the real thing. Pictures are just that—images, representations, clues as to something real and true—they point the way to the thing they depict.



The same is true for our lives as individual followers of Jesus and our life together as a church. We each have a picture of what kind of life we want to live and then we take steps to get there. The challenge is that sometimes our vision is blurred by concern for ourselves or the things immediately in front of us and we don't always see accurately where God wants us to be and to go. The writer of Proverbs describes this well: "If people can't see what God is doing, they stumble all over themselves; But when they attend to what He reveals, they are most blessed." Proverbs 29:18, MSG. So often we stumble all over ourselves because we either can't see or find it inconvenient to see what God is doing. God's call to us is the opposite: to "attend to what He reveals." When we do, we will see an inspiring picture that will create a hunger in our hearts to go chase after that picture in reality, no matter how long or steep or difficult the road to get there.

As many of you have heard, twelve Hope members spent ten months and over eight hundred hours as a part of a "Vision Pathway Team" to "attend to what He reveals." I have shared about our new mission statement several times on Sunday mornings, and some of you were able to attend the special congregational meeting in January to hear more of the details. This September, I would like to paint a picture for you of what God has revealed to our Vision Pathway Team—a compelling and inspiring picture of where God is calling us as a ministry in the next year and beyond. Beginning in October, we will launch into a year of looking at beautiful pictures of where God is calling us. while simultaneously providing real life tools to begin hiking towards the real life places those pictures represent. Together, this theme will be called "HOPE 365." The idea is that we want to spend the next year trusting in God to make us as excited about our mission as we are about the Seahawks during the NFL playoffs. Tall order? Absolutely! But I have a deep belief and faith that God can do anything, so I invite you to join me in praying that He will grow a gnawing hunger in your heart and mine for Him and the mission He is giving us like never before. More details of this picture of our future and tools to hike towards it will be available early in the fall.

Am I a Hog?

When I was a kid playing on the Hope Lutheran basketball team, we had a term for people who, once they got the basketball, would rarely pass it to someone else but would usually take the shot themselves. We called them a "ball hog." It wasn't fun to play on a team with a ball hog, and a team with one, usually didn't win as many games as it should have, especially if the hog wasn't as good of a shooter as he thought he was! Nobody really thought of themselves as that player, and to be called a ball hog was in insult.



As years went by, a group of us from the church met on Sunday nights at SLHS to play basketball just for fun. I remember the evening one very kind, tactful player who shall remain nameless (Jamie Hood) told me, "Loren, when you and your brother are on the same team, there just aren't enough basketballs on the court!" Wow! That was a real eye opener to me. I began to ponder what it was like to play on my team and began to work hard at making good passes and encouraging others on my team rather than assume our best chance of winning was when I shot the most. I tried to quit putting people down for mistakes. You know who had noticeably more fun playing the game? Yep, I did. To this day, the high points that I remember from decades of playing hoops are of

"Do I ask my spouse if it's OK to invite friends over on a given day, or do I tell them when my friends are arriving and what I need?" "Do I discuss major purchases or changes with my spouse, or do I tell them about what I did?" "Do I communicate well when plans change or when I am running late?" "Do I think of ways to show my spouse how much I love them, or am I a 'hog' and wonder what they have done for me lately?"

I can tell you that when I come home, Bernadette always comes to the door and greets me with a smile and a kiss, no matter how hard her day was. She genuinely makes me feel like she is glad that I am home. That encourages me to reciprocate and show her how much I appreciate her. Try to envision yourself in their shoes and you are off to some good conversation and a stronger marriage. When you both try to out-love your spouse, marriage really rocks!


Stephen Ministry Meeting, Monday, September 14, 7:00 p.m.




Priscilla Women's Bible Study


You Are Not Alone - October 2 - 4

Here is a summary of the book:

"There is a path leading to authentic manhood, cut by men who have gone before us, sons following in the footsteps of their fathers, generation after generation. There are perils along the trail, even disasters -- all the more reason to rely on the guidance of a Father who has gone before."



"But in an age when true fathers are in short supply, how do you find the path to manhood? How do you steer clear of the dangers?"

John Eldredge calls men back to a simple and reassuring truth: "God is our Father. In life's trials and triumphs, God is initiating boys and men through the stages of manhood from Beloved Son to Cowboy to Warrior to Lover to King to Sage."

"Fathered by God maps out the path of manhood -- not more rules, not another list of principles, not formulas, but a sure path men have followed for centuries before us."

"Find that path and become the man God sees in you."

"You foolish Galatians! Who has bewitched you? Before your very eyes Jesus Christ was clearly portrayed as crucified. I would like to learn just one thing from you: Did you receive the Spirit by observing the law, or by believing what you heard? Are you so foolish? After beginning with the Spirit, are you now trying to attain your goal by human effort? Have you suffered so much for nothing—if it really was for nothing? Does God give you his Spirit and work miracles among you because you observe the law, or because you believe what you heard?" Galatians 3:1-5

I am very convicted by this passage. I read it as: "You are foolish, Jonathan! What are you doing? Why are you doing it? You know Jesus is real and yet you act as if it's not a big deal..."

Summer can be a very "time off/time away" season for me. I was just talking with my wife, Amy, about how we really haven't been entrenched in God's Word lately. We haven't prayed as regularly as we should, and recently anytime I'm in God's Word it has been for "work" purposes and not for the pursuit of God's heart. In other words, I have just been "doing" things, rather than actually believing.

I love the first verse: "Before your very eyes Jesus Christ was clearly portrayed as crucified." This unbelievable act of genuine love seems to be forgotten during a season like the Summer. The Jesus who defeated death seems to get pushed into the background of our busy lives and we think we will make it up later. But as Amy says, we never "make

up" time with God; we miss out on time with Him. He wants to speak love into us and to encourage, teach, convict, and refresh us. Do we really want to miss out on all our Creator—the Creator of the universe and the one who knows us the best—has to tell us? If a good friend wanted to tell us every morning how much they loved us, would we turn them down?

Let's recognize that the devil is real and can deceive us to care about other things rather than the saving power and wonderful love of God. Let's pause for a moment and ask God to forgive us and get us back on His track.

Elder Extra - Parable of the Sower Wrap-up

Wrapping up the parable of the sower, review the second part of Jesus explanation of the parable in Matthew 13:20-23: "The seed falling on rocky ground refers to someone who hears the word and at once receives it with joy. ²¹ But since they have no root, they last only a short time. When trouble or persecution comes because of the word, they quickly fall away. ²² The seed falling among the thorns refers to someone who hears the word, but the worries of this life and the deceitfulness of wealth choke the word, making it unfruitful. ²³ But the seed falling on good soil refers to someone who hears the word and understands it. This is the one who produces a crop, yielding a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown."

Remember that the sower first casts the seed out, then tills the soil to bury the seed as able. The rocks kept the farmer from being able to cover the seed very deeply in the rocky ground so the seeds were barely



covered. They sprouted first of course, but since the soil was thin above the rocks it dried out quickly and the plants died. Jesus relates this condition to those whose faith has no root and dries up due to "trouble or persecution because of the word". Martin Luther explains this group as a "class of hearers who receive the Word with joy, but they do not persevere. These are a large multitude who understand the Word correctly and lay hold of it in its purity without any spirit of sect, division or fanaticism, they rejoice also in that they know the real truth, and are able to know how they may be saved without works through faith. They also know that they are free from the bondage of the law, of their conscience and of human teachings; but when it strengthen those whose hearts are fully committed to comes to the test that they must suffer harm, disgrace and loss of life or property, then they fall and deny it;...or keep silence about the Word, and work...For these fruits are not only the works, but more the confession, preaching and spreading of the Word, so that many others may thereby be converted and the kingdom of God be developed."

Right now we are still enjoying the peace and freedom of free worship, for the most part, in this country, but it is troubling to see the direction things are heading. In many parts of the world, Christians are being tortured and killed because of their belief in Christ. We must pray for them and ourselves that we may remain faithful to our Lord. It's also very important that we keep the company of seasoned Christians. By doing this, we can learn how to endure hardships and in turn, seek out people who may need that relationship with us.

The third group in this parable is the most troubling to me. Martin Luther describes this group as "those who hear and understand the Word, but still it falls on the other side of the road, among the pleasures and cares of this life, so that they also do nothing with the Word. And there is quite a large multitude of these; for although they do not start heresies, like the first, but always possess the absolutely pure Word, they are also, not attacked on the left as the others with opposition and persecution; yet they fall on the right side and it is their ruin that they enjoy peace and good days. Therefore they do not earnestly give themselves to the Word, but become indifferent and sink in the cares, riches and pleasures of this life, so that they are of no benefit to anyone. Therefore they are like the seed that fell among the thorns. Although it is not rocky but good soil; not wayside but deeply plowed soil; yet, the thorns will not let it spring up, they choke it. Thus these have all in the Word that is needed for their salvation, but they do not make any use of it, and they rot in this life in carnal pleasures. To these belong those who hear the Word but do not bring under subjection their flesh. They know their duty but do it not, they teach but do not practice what they teach, and are this year as they were last."

I find this description very convicting to me personally, and to the American church as a whole. Our linkHOPE coordinator, Karen O'Brien, tells me one of the most common excuses she hears when trying to get people to commit to a small group study is "I just can't squeeze one more thing in". Or how about the church who changed their worship service times because no one was coming to worship during Seahawk games? 2 Chronicles 16:9 says "For the eyes of the Lord range throughout the earth to him." I need to ask God if my heart is truly His. Am I bearing the fruit that He equipped me to do? If I come to worship because I have to or because I didn't come last week, that tells me that my heart is not fully His. But if I come because I want to, then like David in Psalm 122:1, I can say, "I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the Lord." I believe that I have to ask God for supernatural power to be devoted to Him rather than be absorbed into the pull of this world, which in itself may not be bad, but when the pleasures of this world become my top priority, then it is a problem. Take the time to come clean and ask God, "Is my heart fully yours?"

LWML Report - Mite Boxes

Hope Church and School is part of this success!

LWML exceeds record \$1.83 million mission goal!

(from the May Lutheran Reporter)

Is there anything that God - and the estimated 250,000 members of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) - can't do?

The 18 projects to receive LWML funding from the current mission goal include:


