
At Hope, we describe this in our mission statement: "engaging the disinterested to walk in the Hope of Jesus." Engaging the disinterested is something that is fairly obvious in meaning - engage or start discussions with disinterested people that they want to have. There are a lot of different ways to accomplish that, but the meaning is rather clear. What do we mean by "walking in the Hope of Jesus?" Briefly, this is how we describe the Christian life. At Hope, we further define walking in the Hope of Jesus with three ideas: ELEVATION or relationship with God, CONNECTION or friendship with other Christians, and EXPEDITION or seeing our lives as other-centered and as an avenue of service to those in physical and spiritual need.

Our staff and leaders have many great ideas of how we might pursue each of these three things more effectively, to help more disinterested people experience these three things in an increasing way in their lives. Our hope, dream, and prayer is that God would provide an additional \$1.22 million through the generosity of His people over the next two years of 2018 and 2019 to accomplish these things. Many important things are included in the hope of making these additional investments in our mission: taking better care of our facilities, adequately compensating our staff, reducing our debt, growing existing ministries and starting new ones, delivering more regular spiritual care, investing financially in other Christian ministries with whom we partner, both locally and globally, equipping Hope people to serve locally and internationally, and deploying new part time staff people to equip and assist people at Hope and in our community in walking in the Hope of Jesus.

As we begin our 100th anniversary year in January 2018, we will spend some time celebrating the tremendous impact that the ministry of Hope has in the lives of people in Seattle and beyond.

I invite you to Join the Journey as we celebrate and consider what next steps of faith God is calling you to take to move



forward our mission of "engaging the disinterested to walk in the Hope of Jesus." Thank you so much for your generous investment in and support of the ministry of Hope in the present and the past and I look forward to what God will do with us together in the new year and beyond! Merry Christmas!

Here's a little important marriage advice that I never received: Never marry a twin. You

will always be under the scrutiny of comparison. This obviously becomes more evident during the holidays, because one of the first questions on the Christmas day phone call to her twin is "What did Loren get you?" I remember one of the first years we were married I knocked it out of the park. I bought Bernadette a pearl necklace, while her twin sister's husband bought her a dirt bike. I scored huge points that year at the expense (full pun intended) of my brother-in law! I believe the quote to her husband after the Christmas day phone call was something like "What's wrong with this picture?" It reminds me of a sermon years ago by Pastor Iben when he confessed that early in his marriage he bought his wife a fishing reel. While these gifts weren't the best choice, those of you who have been through the "His Needs/Her Needs" material may recognize this as a cry for the emotional need of recreational companionship. (And as a cry for some gift-giving counseling!) The giftgiving guidance on TV during the Seahawks commercials has told me that "Love is a diamond," "A diamond is forever" and that if I want my wife to knock me over onto the couch and kiss me passionately, like I was the latest heart throb at the movies, I need to buy her that necklace with the pendant that has that spirally thing on it. Or buy that fancy new black car and put the giant red bow on it that somehow keeps snow from accumulating on it in the middle of a snow storm while it's parked in the driveway! (Come to think of it, that anti-snow red bow would be nice!) Now Bernadette and I both focus on the real meaning of Christmas—the unfathomable gift of Emmanuel, God with us. Everything else is just, well, stuff. But it is fun to try to find something that will make her eyes light up. After 29 years it just keeps getting tougher and tougher though to find the "perfect gift," especially since my wife is so content. I have already received a text from her twin sister this year that said "Please, please tell me you have some gift ideas for Bernadette." My reply: "I have no clue. Try asking her sister!" ©

Maybe the question really isn't "What is the perfect gift" but "What is the secret of contentment?" Of course I asked my wife that question. I could tell you the answer, but you would hate me. So instead, we'll look at some facts. First off, you need to really know your spouse, which is why the "His Needs/Her Needs" and "The 5 Love Languages" type material is so important. You


need to know what your spouse's emotional needs are before you can fulfill them. (If your spouse hasn't read both of those books, that would be a good stocking stuffer.)

The 5 love languages are: words of affirmation, quality time, receiving gifts, acts of service, and physical touch.

The 10 areas of emotional needs from "His Needs/

Her Needs" are: affection, sexual fulfillment, intimate conversation, recreational companionship, physical attractiveness, honesty and openness, financial support, domestic support, family commitment, and admiration.

Now, if this all sounds like Greek to you, you might want to stop here and go read those two books. Let's take the two examples mentioned previously about the dirt bike and



the fishing reel given to the wives. Without any testing you can tell that one of the top emotional needs for those two guys is recreational companionship. They wouldn't give those gifts to their girls expecting them to use them by themselves. It means they want to enjoy their favorite activities with their wife. So that is a gift giving clue for their wives. Take your spouse's top 2 or 3 needs and narrow your gift giving search area. Ever notice how many "World's best dad, teacher, whatever" shirts there are? That's because some people have a need for affirmation and admiration. Does your spouse have a need for quality time, sexual fulfillment, or physical touch? Give them a weekend getaway for just the two of you. For the need of domestic support how about a coupon for a maid service to come in and clean the house? For the need of honesty and openness how about an evening at a nice restaurant where you can really check in and find out how your partner is doing inside? Does your spouse have a need for family commitment from you? How about joining something the whole family can do together like a Y membership, coach his/ her sports team this coming year, or book a nice family vacation? Does your spouse like to receive gifts? Plan a day where just the two of you can go shopping and pay attention to what they look at and where they want to go. You get the picture - find out what their need is and look for a way to fulfill it. And in the end, if all fails and your spouse won't help you out at all you can do what I do: threaten her with "Do you want the red fishing rod or the blue one?" ©

Mexico Mission News - "El Catecismo Menor de Lutero" by Irene Gehring

300 Spanish Lutheran Catechisms will soon be in the hands of youth and adults at Mexico missions: **Ensenada Christian Ministries** (missionary Diane Mebust), and in the hands of students at **Esperonza Esquela (Hope School)** in the San Juanito area of Chihuahua (missionary Kaare Hagen's Mexico mission area).


How did this come about? A small group of Hope Lutheran Church ladies, who call themselves the Mary Martha Bible Study Circle, direct a portion of their yearly circle contributions to a designated fund. Once a year they decide to whom their gifts will go. The focus is always Christian education. This year they voted to support Friends of Literacy and Ensenada Christian Ministries by purchasing Lutheran Catechisms in Spanish for these two missions.

What joy will accompany these gifts! Just think of it! In this, the 500th year anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation, these students and adults will have their very own copies of the Lutheran Catechism which Martin

Luther first wrote in the German language OF THE PEOPLE 500 years ago!

The Catechism, a textbook for teaching and learning the Christian faith, will be in their very own hands and in their own language - Spanish!

REST Outreach

Recently, Peter and I found ourselves in the ER after Peter broke his arm playing basketball with our son, John. We weren't looking forward to the long wait. But, something beautiful happened as we sat in the waiting room in a "Breakfast Club" type experience with the other waiting patients. We were all brought together by a young woman who was obviously in a lot of pain. We gathered around her in an attempt to comfort and encourage her. And as I talked more to this young woman, I discovered that she had lived on the streets for the past eight years and had a seven year old daughter who lived with her mom. My heart broke as I listened to her story. Unfortunately, she ended up running out of the ER and one of the doctors told me that this happens often.

I share this story because I can't seem to get this sweet girl's face out of mind. Her story is not uncommon. "On any given night in Seattle, hundreds will be sold for sex." according to REST's website. What is REST? "Real Escape from the Sex Trade" and it is an independent 501(c)(3) Washington State Charitable Nonprofit Organization. REST was founded in November 2009 by a small team of women with the the goal of helping the abused find a path to freedom.

We supported REST through our 2017 Women of Hope Spring Tea and raised over \$3000 and collected a large number of undergarments for them to give away.

A small group from Hope attended the annual REST auction where they raised over \$532,000! It was an amazing evening as we heard the stories of women




being set free from years of bondage living on the streets.

We continue to support REST by providing meals at their drop-in center on Rainier Avenue. Sandy Haines will be the leader of this ministry - meeting one Monday evening a month. Our next Monday will be on January 22, where Sandy will lead a team in preparing the meal. Contact Sandy or the Church Office if you would like to contribute. Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) Shared Blessings Rebate

Lutheran Church Extension Fund, our mortgage lender, offers a way to invest and support Hope through the "Shared Blessings Loan Rebate Program." LCEF will refund a percentage of our mortgage back to Hope each year based on the number of individuals who are LCEF investors. Currently, we have 70 investors!



Our LCEF NW District Vice President, Susan Olson, visited Hope in October to share our 2017 rebate of \$7,932.10 which was applied to our outstanding mortgage balance. Our total mortgage balance, as of November 30, is \$3,705,911. Hope needs 60 additional investors to reach the next tier of the rebate which would provide close to a \$13,000 rebate. *Contact Julia Doerr in the church office if you would like to know more about this great program.*

Here are the answers to some Frequently Asked Questions about the program:

- Each INVESTOR is counted, NOT the dollar amount invested or the number of individual investments (the identifier is the social security number).
- A Steward Account can be opened with \$100
 minimum; it does not need monthly deposits and it is
 a demand account. Steward accounts don't earn a lot
 of interest but can enable a person to assist Hope by
 being an investor for a small amount.
- Joint investments count as TWO investors because there are two social security numbers involved.

- The Young Investor (Y.I.) Club does NOT require a monthly deposit; \$25 opens an account and accounts earn a premium interest rate of 3.5%. This is a great gift for a grandchild!
- Those who transfer an IRA to LCEF without opening another type of LCEF investment ARE counted as investors.

"I added \$15 to the \$10. The Bible League International matched these funds and 10 Bibles were sent to Asia. - Melodye I want to share some things that anyone can use to enhance relationships in your life.

- 1. Instead of demanding "it," present it. As parents, we tend to tell our children what to do. What if we presented choices to them instead? Think of how you feel at work when you are micromanaged. You might be defensive towards your boss because you're not given control. But if your boss were to present a few options so you can still work on a your solution, you feel more in control and more ownership of your work. What if we had this approach with our youth? Just recently I was talking to a mother who tells her son "your room is not clean" and just states a fact. She doesn't demand he clean his room, she just simply suggests it is not clean. She allows her son to know she's not pleased with his room, address the situation and hope he comes up with a solution himself. Jesus uses this strategy when he would teach using parables. He simply presented a new reality to the people and hoped they would see more clearly and then respond and follow Him.
- 2. Change the destination. Most of the time we just want to get-to-the-point of the conversation. But what if the point is the conversation? What if being in conversation is the point? When planes where invented, the cargo ship industry was heading for doom, because people where no longer cruising by boat. But a very smart person decided to change the cargo ship into a cruise ship; which saved the industry. Instead of the ship being the mode of transportation, the ship became the destination. Sometimes as parents we miss the destination.
 Sometimes the purpose is to fix something and "get-to-the-point," but we cannot miss what truly is the destination.
- 3. If you want a new perspective try laying on the floor. When Jesus says in Luke 14 that you should "take the lowest seat," he's referring to being humble so that you will be asked to take a better seat. While you're sitting in the lowest seat, waiting, you are given a point-of-view that you wouldn't have had if you jumped to the highest seat. When I need a new perspective, I lay on the floor. At first my wife thought it was weird to see me lying on the floor and looking at the ceiling. But I told her I was gaining a

- new perspective and now she's used to it. Maybe when you're hanging out as a family, try sitting on the floor with your back to the couch instead of sitting on the couch. Or try lying down on the floor and having a conversation with your youth. What if you ask them to take your seat and you move to a different seat?
- *4. Listen.* Try literally listening—not saying a word—being silent.
- 5. Saying sorry, when you need to. As weird as it sounds, confession is one of my favorite things to do. When you confess something to God you are acknowledging it bringing it to light and asking Him to forgive you. It restores the relationship.

FIVE THOUGHTS FOR YOU



Do you really desire a relationship with your youth? Then you need to be vulnerable and authentic with them. That means admitting when you have made mistakes in parenting and asking them to forgive you. This practice alone will tear down any walls between you and your child.


